

Lesson 3: "Let My People Go"

Text: Exodus 5:1-7:13

Objectives:

- Recognize the purpose of the plagues on Egypt: "that they may know I am Jehovah"
- Follow the progression of events from Moses' first meeting with Pharaoh to the Exodus




